

Visits to Austria by O-Sensei's disciples without permanent influence

- Kisaburo Osawa 1984 to Vienna (ukes: Seki Sensei and Kuribayashi Sensei)
- Kenji Shimizu in Graz 2-3 times invited by Peter Poltch
- Seiichi Sugano ÖAV invited him to Vienna, Graz and Linz 4 times between 1986 and -87. His last visit was 2007
- Mitsunari Kanai in Graz 1988?

Juo Iwamoto 1.

- Had been practising Judo in Japan.
- He was truly impressed by O-Sensei and changed to aikido.
- O-Sensei's disciple "from pre-war times", but doesn't appear on the Disciple table.
- Lived in Austria 1968(or -9) -1992. He arrived as 4th dan with a teaching-licence from Hombu Dojo.
- First practises were in school-halls, after 2 yeas in the 5th Bezirk, fitness studio "FitNeiss"
- Worked as a shiatsu therapist and had education in classical japanese singing. His living conditions were poor – students built him a shower.
- Many funny culture-clash stories the students needed to get him out of trouble often.
- Complicated relationship to Junichi Yoshida
- Mr. Hajime Seki (from Japanese Embassy, later 6-7. dan) had his permission to teach aikido in Budocenter 1984, when it opened.

Juo Iwamoto's main students

Gerd Pöckl

- first 1. dan to 4.dan in Austria, excluding Junichi Yoshida
- Taught in Budocenter and "Fitness studio"
- Established Meiyukai
- Later invited Hosokawa Sensei from Italy, and Endo Sensei from Japan together with Margit Melcher

Ronald Karnik

- Started jujutsu dojo (with Karl S.?),
- aikido dojo in Baden b.Wien (now not operational) and Aiki-no-michi Dojo (as he studied with Noro Sensei "ki-no-michi")

Robert Bessler

- 1 dan from Iwamoto, 2 dan from Hosokawa.
- Funny stories about visiting Doshu (Kisshomaru Ueshiba) and the Imperial Dojo in Tokyo
- Elisabet Feber (now stopped aikido),
- Veronika (Vera) Molitor

Nobuyoshi Tamura Sensei (1933-2010)

- Entered Hombu dojo in 1953, dispatched to Marseille, France 1964
- Large following/sister organisations in France, Italy, West Germany, UK, Belgium, Switzerland (and Sweden??)
- First visit to Austria 1977 invited by Junichi Yoshida
- Main teacher in Austria visited 2 times a year
- ÖAV was founded Oct 1979 (or -8). Tamura Sensei was the technical commission with Juo Iwamoto Sensei

Tamura Sensei's main disciples, living abroad and teaching in Austria

- Toshiro Suga
 - Visits Enshiro Dojo Salzburg & Wien and Shobukan Dojos Vien
- Jeff Raji
 - Often shares seminars with Toshiro Suga
- Claude Pellerin
 - Technical director of Shumeikan a seminar every 3 months or so
- Tiki Shewan
 - He is an iaido swordsmith and expert on Iaido and Jodo. Studied aikido under Arikawa Sensei
- Stephane Benedetti
 - visits yearly Graz (?),
- Pierre Chassang
 - Taught winter-seminars invited by Aikido Union Linz. These seminars were later taught by Toshiro Suga. Organiser changed later to Enshiro Dojo.
- Michael Neary, street children in Birmingham" no recent visits (?)

Tamura Sensei's and Junichi Yoshida's early students

- Friedrich "Fritz" Kemler, started the first dojo in Wien (Aikikai Wien.)
 - His students then started other dojos. He could be called the Father of dojos in Wien.
- Maria Widl, stopped practising, moved to Germany?
- Rupert and Karin Strobl
 - traveled to Vienna and brought Aikido to Graz. Now stopped practising
- Günther Steger
 - helped to start many dojos in Austria, Hungary, Ukraine, Slovakia
 - Technical Director of ÖAV for 22 years, organised&taught e.g. Black Belt Seminars
 - Now on technical Board of Mutokukai Europe
- Thomas Hammberger → Linz
- Jörg Swetina, later chairman of ÖAV, reconciliation with Iwamoto group.
- Wolfgang Linert → Musubikan Wien
- Wolfang Fürst now General Secretary of AAA-ÖAV
- Karlheiz Reiter → Shobukan Dojo 1993
 - Teaches also in Germany, France, Italy, Hungary
- Georg Meindl → established Austrian Aikidoschools.
 - He teaches also in Germany, Croatia, Slovakia and Hungary
- Frank Koren, now teaches in Graz and is with Junichi Yoshida the only 6. dan in AAA-ÖAV

Junichi Yoshida

- Started aikido in Osaka in dojo of Bansei Tanaka 1969
- Came to Austria as 1.dan 1972
- Started teaching 1977 as 2nd dan with Jujutsu group in USI (then UTA)
- Didn't get well along with Iwamoto Sensei
- invited Tamura Sensei to Austria 1977
- Was deeply involved in development of aikido in Austria and started the core dojos in Wien, Graz and Linz.
- Stopped teaching 1984 and returned to Japan 1986
- His main students (see previous page)

Current major other teachers

- Seishiro Endo Sensei 8. dan
 - First visit to Austria 1995 in Linz (ÖAV invitation)
 - Visits once a year since 1996 Wien (Meiyukai invitation), receives dan-exams.
 - Kimusubi Dojos have organised international teacher seminars 2004 and 2005.
- Christian Tissier 7. dan
 - Arrived first time 1988 invited by Aikidoschools to Wels
 - Visits Aikidoschools and Ki-no-Michi dojo every 2nd year
- Yukimitsu Kobayashi 7.dan
 - visited first time 2003 by invitation of Aikidoschools as part of Hombu development program. Irony is, that the same year ÖAV had received Hombu recognition. He was later followed by ->
- Koichi Toriumi Sensei 7. dan
 - First visit to Austria via Hombu development program
 - Visits once a year to Aikidoschools since, receives dan-exams
- Matti Joensuu 6. dan
 - established Kimusubi Dojos in Austria 2002
 - teaches in Austria, Finland, Spain, Hungary, Germany, Canada etc.

Juo Iwamoto arrived to Austria as 4. dan. He tried first to teach aikido to the police.
A slow start phase, characterised by aikido being unknown, and students (Ronald Karnik, Gerd Pöckl, Robert Bessler) absorbed the culture clash between a soldier-samurai and culture in Austria.
Junichi Yoshida arrived to Vienna as 1. dan.
Started teaching (separately from Iwamoto Sensei) Oct 1977
Fritz Kemler and Maria Widl started aikido. In the following years, Rupert and Karin Strobl traveled to Vienna and took aikido to Graz.
First visit of Tamura Sensei, invited by Junichi Yoshida.
Gert Pöckl (started aikido in 1970) graded the first 1. dan in Austria to Iwamoto Sensei.
Günther Steger started to practise aikido

Oct 1978 (or -79)	ÖAV (Austrian Aikido Federation) was founded by Aikido Union Wien (Maria Widl), Aikikai Wien (Friz Kemler) and Aikido Union Graz (Robert Strobl). Günther Müller was the president, Junichi Yoshida the General Secretary, Iwamoto and Tamura Senseis were the Technical Commission, and Pierre Chassang the adviser (student of Tamura Sensei)
1983- 1984	Junichi Yoshida stopped teaching. National teachers started to emerge. Ikeda Sensei taught seminars in Graz 1983,-84,-85 invited by ÖAV
1984	Gert Pöckl received 3.dan 1.6.1984. The ÖAV "Ranking" that year was: 2.dan: Ronald Karnik, Fritz Kemler, Maria Widl 1.dan: Rupert Strobl, Karin Strobl, Gerhard Fürst, Günther Steger, Margit Tesar, Irene Guldt, Walter Holzer

1984	Budocenter opened – Hajime Seki sarted teaching there. His "home dojo" was the Imperial Dojo in Tokyo (not Hombu dojo etc.).
1985?	Junichi Yoshida graded 4. dan as the first in Austria. At the same time Karin and Strobl Rupert, Gerhard Fürst, Günther Steger graded 2.dan
1986	Junichi Yoshida moved back to Japan. Then there were 6 members in ÖAV: Aikido Union Wien (Maria Widl), Aikikai Wien (Fritz Kemler), Aikido Union Graz (Irene Guldt), ASKÖ Aikido Club Graz (Rupert Strobl), Aikido Union Linz, Aikido Union Salzburg. Average number of persons was about 15 – so a total of 90-100 aikidokas in Austria. (NOTE: does this exclude students of Iwamoto Sensei?)
1987	Hajime Seki returned to Japan, leaving responsibility to Gerd Pöckl
1992	Juo Iwamoto returned to Japan
1994	Hosokawa Sensei's first visit to Vienna invited by Meiyukai
1995	Endo Sensei's first visit to Austria invited by ÖAV

1999	ÖAV book-keeping had 17 clubs with about 20 members each, so about 350 aikidokas in Austria. This figure likely excludes independent dojos, dojos with Iwamoto-background and Aikidoschools.
Oct 1999	Federation of Austrian Aikidoschools was established by Georg and Regina Meindl and Martin Hölzl. From 2000-2002 Masatomi Ikeda was the technical director.
2002	-Ikeda Sensei became illGert Pöckl received as the first austrian 5. dan 8.Sept.2002 -Matti Joensuu, 5.dan and Andrea Stitzel, 2.dan arrived to Austria from Japan in August 2002 and established Kimusubi Dojos in Kärnten with the help of Günther Steger. The first 5.dan in Austria was a Finn?
January 2003	ÖAV received Hombu Recognition. Curiously enough, the same year Kobayashi Yukimitsu Sensei had a seminar with Aikidoschools. Since then Hombu dojo has sent a teacher (now Toriumi Sensei) invited by Aikidoschools.

2006	Hombu Dojo recognised Aikidoschools as equally representing aikido in Austria as ÖAV. Matti Joensuu received the first 6. dan in Austria
August 2009	Birankai Continental Europe (Chiba Sensei) was dissolved. This lead to Birankai Austria in Dornbirn to receive Hombu Recognition in 1. March 2010.
9. July 2010	Tamura Sensei died.
July 2010→	After a period of shock, all the hell broke loose in aikido organisations in Austria. Tamura Sensei had not organised his Europen-wide legacy. Hombu Dojo – being not aware of the local situation - organised a "blanket coverage" and asked Yamada Sensei, from New York, to supervise the situation. Junichi Yoshida, having been absent from Austria for 24 years, claimed the status of "responsible of Austria" after meetings in Hombu Dojo.
End-of-2010	ÖAV had a clearly dominant position in Austria. It was also very open-minded to include dojos from other aikido styles than from Tamura Sensei – e.g. Kimusubi dojos had joined ÖAV in 2008. ÖAV had then 30-32 dojos as "members" and 16 as "non-member" – not comprehensive list of dojos as e.g. Birankai was not listed. Nobody actually knew how many aikido dojos there were in Austria and from what background.

2011 to mid- 2012	Intentionally left BLANK
August 2012 Status:	Hombu Recognised Federations: AAA-ÖAV: has 17 dojos and 1 abroad Aikidoschools: has 11 dojos and 6 abroad Birankai: has 2 dojos in Dornbirn Federations with Hombu-recognition application pending: Kimusubi Dojos: has 2 dojos in Austria and 2 abroad Dojos belonging to Mutokukai Europe: 3 (in Vienna, Graz, Feldkirch) Dojos belonging to Aikikai Liechtenstein: 2 One could estimate that there are 45 dojos in Austria, so 7-10 dojos are independent, although follow some definite style (e.g. Ki-nomichi follows Tissier Sensei). Austria is not represented in IAF.
